

Christian Education



Advent is a season in the Church calendar dedicated to the hopeful anticipation for the arrival or "advent" of Jesus of Nazareth. The word advent comes from the Latin term adventus, meaning "arrival" or "coming," particularly the coming of something having great importance. Advent season, then, is both a time of joy-filled, anticipatory celebration of the arrival of Jesus Christ


Advent season is an extraordinary time of year. The first day of Advent is the first day of a new Liturgical (or church) calendar and begins four weeks of preparation for the nativity of Jesus Christ at Christmas. Avent is all about reflecting on how we can prepare our hearts and homes for Christ's birth in the world as it is today. It is a time for faith communities and families to remember, through prayer, reflections, special music, and good deeds, the true meaning of Jesus.

The evergreen wreath and candles in the church are full of symbolism tied to the Christmas season. The wreath, which is made of various evergreens, signifies continuous life. The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolizes God's eternity, the soul's immortality, and the eternal life we find in Christ. The wreath is meant to remind us of both the immortality of our souls and God's promise of everlasting life through Christ.

The candles also have their special significance. The four colored candles represent the four weeks of Advent, and one additional candle is lit each Sunday. The flames of candles represent the Christmas light approaching, bringing hope and peace in the struggle against darkness.

- The first candle, which is the color purple, symbolizes Hope. It is called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, especially Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. It represents the expectation felt in anticipation of the coming Messiah.
- The second candle, also purple, represents Peace. It is called the "Bethlehem Candle" as a reminder of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.
- The third candle, which is the color pink, symbolizes Joy. The "Shepherd's Candle" is called pink because the rose is a liturgical color for Joy. The third Sunday of Advent is Gaudete Sunday and is meant to remind us of the joy that the world experienced at the birth of Jesus, as well as the joy that the faithful have reached the midpoint of Advent.
- The fourth week of Advent, symbolizes Love. We light the third purple candle to mark the last week of prayer and penance as we wait for the birth of our Savior.
- The final candle, which is white is called the "Angel's Candle." It symbolizes Peace and reminds us of the message of the angels: "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men."



Highlighting Paula Singleton



Paula Singleton, a dedicated member, has committed herself to serving others through her ministries at St. Luke's, the Episcopal Diocese of Washington, and various nonprofits in the metropolitan area. Her unwavering dedication is truly inspiring.

Paula's journey at St. Luke's began in her childhood when she was an active participant in church school and the Young People's Fellowship group (YPF). It was here that her leadership skills first emerged, setting the stage for her future contributions.

As with so many, she took a break from every Sunday attendance to occasional visits after starting college. In 1979, through a message received from God during a storm, she renewed her relationship with St. Luke's. In the late '70s and early '80s, many families with young children had already begun to migrate away from St. Luke's, causing fewer youth to be present at the church. Her return excited the older members who had remained at St. Luke's Episcopal Church. They took her under their wing and encouraged her to participate at the parish and diocese levels.

After retiring in 2006 due to illness, Paula began supporting the ministries at St. Luke's. Her passion for helping others led to outreach projects, supporting senior parish members with everyday tasks, and providing rides.

She worked with the existing feeding program seniors had in place in the 70s. She has continued to be concerned about welcoming those in need. Working to provide assistance with projects started by the various rectors and groups, she has continued as Chair of Outreach to work with such nonprofits as Samaritan Ministry of Greater Washington, Housing Up (formerly known as Transitional Housing), Christ House, Seabury Resources for the Aging (formerly Episcopal Senior Ministries), Martha's Table, Bishop Walker School for Boys, and providing donations/support to senior housing residents and displaced families.

She has served as Treasurer of the Episcopal Diocese of Washington (EDOW), Lay Eucharistic Minister, EDOW Finance and Audit Committee member, and Episcopal Church Women of EDOW. She has also served as St. Luke's Senior and Junior Wardens and Treasurer.


God has chosen to direct Paula to continue the work at St. Luke's that many elders whom she respected and loved started. He has promised to walk with her, giving her strength and resources to continue.

Highlighting George Nicol, Jr.



Thank you, St. Luke's, for the Books

Thanks to St. Luke's, the children living at The Terrell, a transitional housing community in the neighborhood for single parents, received more than 500 books in November. The fifty-plus families residing at The Terrell transition every ninety to 120 days, so with 500 books, there are sufficient books for the children living there for six months ...or more. The books collected and donated by the community and our parishioners' included books for young people of all ages, including some textbooks such as an Algebra book and novels and story books for new readers. There were also books that parents could use to help teach their young ones to read. This generous donation has had a profound impact on these children, providing them with a sense of ownership and a love for reading that will last a lifetime.

The gift of books to the children at The Terrell means a great deal to these young people, as they have very few things they can call "their own." The books St. Luke's gives them are theexception, as the books they select for themselves are "for keeps"; they don't have to return them as with library books. Again, thank you, St. Luke's, for your personal and heartfelt contribution that is making a significant difference in the lives of the children at The Terrell.
